CHARLES EDWARD DUBLE (1884-1960), Inductee 1980

Charles Edward "Charlie" "C.E." Duble was born in Jeffersonville, IN, a town across the Ohio River from Louisville, on September 13, 1884. His parents were Augustus Reynold and Elizabeth (Fitzpatrick) Duble. He used his initials, "C.E.", professionally for his entire career as a composer and circus historian. Duble played the trombone in circuses, minstrel shows, vaudeville, and other touring entities from 1908 until 1940, and this long tenure was even more remarkable when one considers the sheer number of shows with which he performed. He had 35 musical works published, most of which were marches. Many of these were dedicated to circus musicians and bandmasters. An oddity about his career is that he never became a

Duble had an amazing memory for dates, names, and details of shows that he attended or performed in, including some from his boyhood before he began playing. He used this facility in his role as an important circus historian and was a prolific letter writer to Billboard and numerous local newspapers.

His most famous march is Bravura, an exciting circus march that begins in the key of G minor. Perhaps due to its minor key, it is often attributed to Karl King, as he was one of the best minor key march writers. Other well known and often performed circus works from Duble include Barnum & Bailey's Royal Pageant, Battle of the Winds, Old Glory Triumphant, Ringling Brothers Grand Entrée, Sounds from the Harem, Wizard of the West, Evans' Fashion Plate, Under White Tents, and Troopers Greeting, which was dedicated to Sun Bros. Bandmaster Charles Gerlach.

A beloved Windjammer euphoniumist, the late Ed Ballenger (WJU #597), who was also from Jeffersonville, collated Duble's datebooks and other memorabilia, and this material is now held by the Parkinson Library and Circus Archive in Baraboo, WI.

Duble's last year as a trombone player with a touring show was 1940. He then played around Louisville and Jeffersonville in various performances and worked other



jobs. He toured as a ticket taker with the Sparks Circus during 1947 and 1948. In the 1950's, he carried on a prolific letter writing exchange with legendary circus historian Sverre Braathen (WJU #9, Windjammers Hall of Fame 2009), and he passed on extensive information on the use of music during circuses and the bands on minstrel shows.

C.E. Duble never married. He died in Jeffersonville, IN, on August 19, 1960, as a result of a carcinoma in his neck that had spread to his throat and brain. He is buried at Saint Anthony Cemetery, sharing a tombstone with his brother Raymond Augustus Duble (1888-1944). C.E. Duble was elected to the WJU Hall of Fame as our 10th inductee.
