1968 ALADDIN TEMPLE SHRINE CIRCUS Musical Program

The 18th Annual Aladdin Temple Shrine Circus took place in Columbus, Ohio in April 1968 in the Ohio State Fairgrounds Coliseum. Produced by M & M Productions (Charles Marine and Grace McIntosh) the program included many famous circus world names: the Cristiani Family Riding Act, Tony Smaha, clown Chester "Bobo" Barnett, Hugo Zacchini, and the Clyde Beatty-Cole Bros. performing elephants under the direction of Rex Williams.

The 1968 performance was accompanied by a first-rate band of local musicians led by veteran circus bandleader Izzy Cervone.

In 1968, there was no formal fans group such as Windjammers Unlimited specifically dedicated to circus music. What little information we have about circus musical programs from back then is largely due to the efforts of a few far-sighted individuals who, on their own initiative, either sat on the bandstand during a performance and wrote down the titles as the music was being played, or who arranged to record the performance.

One such individual was future Windjammers Unlimited president Robert P. Hills, Jr. (WJU #71, WJU Hall of Fame 2013). A tuba player in the Aladdin Temple Shrine Circus band, Bob would record each year's performance using his own professional-quality equipment. Today, these recordings are an invaluable record of what Shrine Circus musical programs from a half a century ago were like.

Recently, I relistened to Bob's recording of the 1968 Aladdin Temple Shrine Circus performance and wrote down as many of the titles as I could recognize. Since I didn't have a copy of that year's souvenir program, I had to rely on my memories of the performance to come up with the names of the acts that appeared that year.

Bob's edited version of the 1968 performance eliminates the opening grand entry and starts with the first act.

Hugo Zacchini cannon:



Hugo Zacchini (1898 - 1975) was the first human cannonball to use a compressed-air cannon. His father invented the compressed-air cannon used to propel humans in circus acts. Hugo was also known for being a daredevil and a painter, with two engineering degrees from the University of Florida, and a Master's of Art degree from Jamestown Academy in New York.
