Did you know that the Quad Cities was the first in the U.S. to offer riverboat gaming? In 1991, the region launched a nationwide resurgence of gaming when the Diamond Lady Casino was the first casino to open in Bettendorf, Iowa. The President Casino opened about an hour later on the riverfront in Davenport, Iowa.

Today, three land-based casinos operate daily in the Quad Cities – Isle Casino Hotel Bettendorf, Bally's Quad Cities Casino & Hotel in Rock Island, and Rhythm City Casino Resort in Davenport.

The Channel Cat Water Taxi has been recognized as a "Locals Love Us" winner, and was showcased by National Geographic and the Mississippi River Geotourism Stewardship Council as one of the best destinations for travelers seeking an authentic experience of the region. The open-air boats are a leisurely way to enjoy the Mississippi River as it flows east to west for one of only a few times over its length.

The Celebration Belle is a family-owned riverboat, proudly cruising the Mississippi River, and has been welcoming guests onboard for 39 years. This beautiful 750 passenger, 4-deck riverboat is a favorite attraction here in the Quad Cities area. The Celebration Belle has two enclosed dining decks, two observation decks with plenty of outdoor seating, a large gift shop, all meals freshly prepared onboard and fabulous entertainment. We are the only riverboat in any of our cruising areas with an elevator onboard.

See handmade vodka, gin and whiskey made from local grains at Mississippi River Distilling Company & Cody Road Cocktail House, get a behind-the-scenes look at the making of our famous Isabel Bloom sculptures, visit the historic mansions of the Deere family, the Beiderbecke family, and the Hauberg Estate, or take a tour of our lock & dam system – one of the largest roller dams in the world. Our tours all have an authentic story to tell about our history and our people.

If self-guided adventures are more your style, we have you covered. Our historic neighborhoods, downtowns and the Rock Island Arsenal offer a variety of self-guided tours through brochures and mobile phone apps. The Rock Island Arsenal Museum is the Army's second oldest museum. It first opened to the public on

July 4,1905. The primary mission is to collect, preserve, and interpret the history of Rock Island Arsenal and Arsenal Island. By focusing on "People, Processes, and Products," the exhibits tell the story of the people involved in Arsenal Island's history, the manufacturing processes used at Rock Island Arsenal, and the military equipment that was produced at Rock Island Arsenal.



The Rock Island Arsenal Museum is nationally recognized for its large and impressive small arms collection. Over twelve hundred U.S., foreign, civilian, and military small arms are on permanent display.
